ReviewMeta too scans over product reviews. Using algorithms, statistics, and data science, they are able to scan thousands of reviews in a matter of seconds in order to identify any unnatural patterns they can discover.

Review Analyzer Browser Extension

ReviewMeta is free as is the browser extension. The web tool does as the site and analyzes millions of reviews, looking for those who are trustworthy and suspicious, in order to give you the consumer, an unbiased product score. It does the heavy lifting so you don't have to.

At one point, you would have had to copy and paste a product URL into the ReviewMeta search bar. Thankfully, this is no longer the case. The Chrome Extension has streamlined this process by putting the adjusted rating on display at the top of your browser while you shop.

When the dialog box pops up, click the Add Extension button.

Every review that is analyzed is assigned a weight. The weight can range from 100 to 0, starting at 100. For every failed test during analysis, the review weight may lose points. The weight of a review is only adjusted by the available reviews still on the product site. The algorithm can often be confused by reviews that have since been deleted from the site. Though those reviews are no longer available to be seen on the product site, the data still remains on ReviewMeta. The weight may no longer be adjusted by the missing review but neither is the data initially received from when the review had originally been available.

David Gaughran, an author who peddles his books on Amazon, also houses a beef with ReviewMeta's algorithm tests claiming, "When it comes to books, it makes a number of pejorative assumptions about what is legitimate reader behavior." These assumptions based around such things as "reviewing Book 2 of a series after reviewing Book 1 or mentioning the title of the book in the
